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# **Report from the Executive Director**



As I attempt to write my report I find myself with a huge block. This will be my last report, spanning the last 21 years yikes! So, to meet deadlines I have decided to complete my report in two parts, first highlights of last year, and second my personal comments, observations, and well, farewell.

I will present that part at the AGM in person with hopes it will be added to the full AGM Report as an addendum. The following represents only a few tidbits of the many great things that happened at CCR over the last year.

#### **CCR West**

- West Community Services Team ran their first Enhancing Independent Behaviour Program and Social Skills Program, both were a great success;
- A new office in Dryden will give us more of a community perspective;
- We have formed a new partnership with Confederation College who are providing space for some of our group services;
- We continue our partnership with Autism Ontario in training our staff and the development of SibShops to be delivered across the region.

#### **Best Start Hubs**

- We have Kids in Motion (or Outreach) programs happening in surrounding schools in our Hub neighbourhoods;
- · We have reached out to the staff and families at Genevra House. In addition we have connected with Cedar Place, Salvation Army, Pregnancy Care Centre, some of the housing units and many food banks;
- We have also partnered with Our Children Our Future (OCOF) to offer some Family Fun Nights with dinner in the community. We also partnered with Better Beginnings Better Futures (BBBF) -Donovan Hub this summer by joining together at a local park;
- In addition to all the Community Connections, we have provided about 3 Triple P seminars last year, and about 35 Triple P families have received the support of 1-1 primary care service;
- We were successful in partnership with the English school boards in offering five Early Learning Preschool Programs on social skill development, promotion of self-regulation, helping children and families make the connection to the school setting.

# **Community Services Team**

- This summer a condensed version of our Junior and Senior Social Skills Group was offered; content included: Recognizing Strengths and Challenges, Flexible Thinking, Thoughts, Feelings and Reactions, Self-monitoring, 5 point scale, Identifying Positive Relationships, Conversation Skills, and Conflict Management
  - Coordination and collaboration among ABA Consultants, Residential Support Lead, and Residential Support provided great opportunities to learn from one another while supporting our clients in being successful,
  - Facilitators were thrilled to see examples of many great social skills being utilized during instructional periods and natural activities,
- For us, this was a great testament of all of the hard work CCR staff are doing to touch the lives of the children and youth we work with.

### **Quality Assurance Department**

#### Webinars with Ontario Centre of **Excellence for Child and Youth Mental Health**

- Recognized provincially as a leader in evaluation design and implementation, CCR's Quality Assurance Department was invited to present their unique program evaluation communication strategies with the Centre of Excellence for Child & Youth Mental Health in the following webinars
  - To Infinity and Beyond: Sustaining Evaluation (January 2013)
  - Strategies for Communicating Evaluation Findings (February to May 2013)
  - Evaluation 101 (October 2013)

As a result of having the opportunity to share our expertise, numerous requests have been received from organizations throughout the province for CCR's unique program evaluation design and communication strategies.

#### **Conference Presentations**

• This November, CCR will be participating in facilitating three presentations at the 9th annual CANS Conference in San Francisco, CA including two Breakout Sessions and one Poster Session

#### In the Words of the Children and Youth we serve:

 Results of the Applied Behaviour Analysis (ABA) Services program evaluation indicate that children and youth thorough enjoy CCR's Social and Life Skills groups. In the words of our families, participants have commented that the Program for the Education and Enrichment of Relational Skills (PEERS\*) was the "Best group they've ever been to." That Enhancing Independent Behaviour (EIB) gave them the opportunity to "meet new friends", and that the Secret Agent Society (SAS) provided "new gadgets to help keep calm."

#### Family-Centered Care

• In early 2012, CCR was awarded a 3 year grant by the Ontario Centre for Excellence for Child and Youth Mental Health designed to support a core team within the agency to implement Family Centered Care.

### **Regional Clinical Team**

• 2 members of our Regional Clinical Team (RCT), attended the Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule (ADOS) 2 training in New York and started participating in the ADOS Clinic schedule. Other training for the whole team included Ethical & Behavioural Standards.

### **Respite and Residential**

- Ten Rainbows House has been very well utilized for many services across our continuum
- The residential program now includes a home on Bedford Court for two youth with complex special needs

### Autism Intervention Program

- A new centre based IBI program opened in Oaks Plaza Sudbury
- In April, CCR took the lead for Autism Intervention Program (AIP) services in Sault Ste Marie

Our thanks to Community Living Algoma (CLA) for their contribution as long time partners. We look forward to continuing with them in new partnerships.

#### **OAG Audit**

In March, as part of the Ontario Auditor General's audit of Autism Intervention Program (AIP), CCR's programs were audited. The full respect will be presented to the Government this December.

### Agency Review

- Following on information from the Office of the Auditor General of Ontario (OAG) audit, CCR underwent an agency wide records management review;
- · Results and recommendations will be implemented over the next year.

A group of CCR employees attended a conference promoting the French language on March 9th, 2013. We were fortunate to interview the guest speaker, Stéphane Paquette, a singer-songwriter, improvcomedian and actor from Chelmsford, Ontario. Stéphane has won numerous awards for his music including the Top 40, Under 40 award in 2006.

Q: What was your take home message today? A: Using humour, I wanted to break-free from the common stereotype that says we're all hardcore French activists. Yes, French services are important, especially considering our predecessors fought very hard so that we could receive French language services. Today, I wanted to emphasize that we aren't that different. In fact, there are 1,700 words that are spelled identically in French and in English and are true or semi-true cognates.
